I was born in 1912 - mother came to widow in 1914. started and was know how a parish big as bigger. my mother had 5/- a week allowance from the Parish and I remember buying a tin of Borden's when the miners was learning started in to surrender in 1926 when the first WIDOWERS WAS PAID IT WAS 10/- a week then we had then the Lord George? the overes was living on the fat of the land.

Even the land owners was living on their own produce, and if they was without coal, they had plenty of wood to burn.

when I started wood work in 1926 my job was to find and chop wood to keep the fire burning. (when the farmers had a milk strike most farmers Poured Poured there milks down the drain. my boss had left milk turned into cheese when the strike was over we had a room full of cheese. that means when in time of want, the Rich could live on the fat of the land. the price of land went by 10 £ each year the 1940s 200 acres was sold for \$6,000 in 1992 the asking price for 300 acres was \$35,000 (sorry that is wrong) according to Neward, the asking 300 year old property set in 3/4 of an acre was around \$235,000)

the house had been refurbished and retaining exposed beams and timbers. the original staircase and a vaulted cellar. Maybe it was the improvements that put the price up. the first Farm 200 acres is still there but the large FARM HOUSE ETC HAS BEEN PULLED DOWN. Maybe it was bought by a local man hung himself on the Balanster) that would be the reason?

The Farm manage at in 1940 would be getting around \$3 a week if he was paid in gold Sovereigns, and Buried them they now would be worth around £200 or 200 \$ a laborer or stockman paid in silver, not copper. would be a bit less. know the price of silver has gone up, the pennies? I have still have some, I don't know still when they bury a poor man, it still the same for amount of land some where about 2sq yards. the price of land the Churches should be worth more than they did 50 years ago? who owns the land the Rich was buried on. 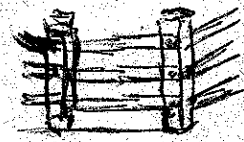

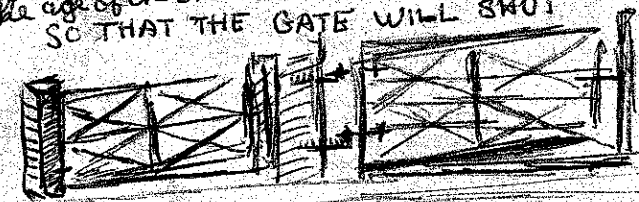

 all breeding birds Blood Tested  
 Report blood testing. all Reactors not used for breeding,  
 (BWD) Pemphig Blue Stone  
 1929-1936 (Blue Vireos) to the Gall  
 Rupe. - dipped in 12oz. and 1 pot of (Blue Vireos) to the Gall  
 Chicking Fox - all birds vaccinated on leg. lipid painted with 1 gallon  
 Diphtheria swollen throats and mucous in mouth.  
 all Bird inoculated, full time all the year round.  
 Breeding for 6 months of the year, 500 pullets chick, daily  
 Brooder house under Electric Brooders. to 4 weeks 250 in each  
 section, 4 sections in each house, of 2 making 8 sec -  
 at 4 week they had been cooled off starting at 80° and cooled  
 off by 1 degree a day & the moved to Golden - 50 in each four  
 brooder, Total (13 Golden 30) off at 8 weeks of age they was  
 moved to arks - 30 to each ark with run alls moved every  
day up to 70 to move when the grower, to the point off  
 and room for nest boxes - their was 30 off them to be moved  
 by tractor, over 1000 Breeder kept in them + 1 stock bird to  
 each 10 birds, spaced 5 yard between each house. with perches and

 get them sheer. Mr Shaw used to go to see if all grain was  
 picked up, on a wet day feeding 1000 birds of free range was quite  
 a job. in these some in each house, Shuttling was quite a big  
job as some houses was ever crowded and other nearly empty so you had  
 birds about - to thin the thover crowding - because in Double  
 summer time we was their till gone mid night -  
 over 7000 Birds was runnings loose at the middle off the breeding  
 season it took 2 men to do the job
